THE FAST OF TEVET

On the 10th day of the Jewish month of Tevet, in the year 3336 from Creation (425 BCE), the armies of the Babylonian emperor Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem. Thirty months later—on 9 Tammuz 3338—the city walls were breached, and on 9 Av of that year the Holy Temple was destroyed. The Jewish people were exiled to Babylonia for 70 years.

The 10th of Tevet (this year, January 5, 2012) is observed as a day of fasting, mourning and repentance by many Jews. All over the world many will fast, mourn and pray, remembering the day which began the siege on Jerusalem and led to the conquest of the city, the destruction of the Holy Temple, and the expulsion of the people of Israel from their land. They refrain from food and drink from daybreak to nightfall, and add *Selichot Prayers* and other special supplements to their prayers. More recently, the 10th of Tevet has been chosen to also serve as a “general *kaddish* day” remembrance for the victims of the Holocaust, many of whose day of martyrdom is unknown.

Today, many, many years later, Jerusalem is once again under siege. Oh, you can get into your car and drive west to Tel Aviv but going north, east or south is quite a different matter. The supermarkets are stocked with Corn Flakes and low-fat yogurt. But it is a siege as terrible and as deadly as any the city has known.

In and around the city and throughout the country, the enemy hurls rocks, bullets and bombs at Jewish soldiers and schoolbuses and whatever or whoever else gets in their way. While children contemplate the loss of their mothers, fathers, and siblings yet others may contemplate the loss of their legs, diplomats scurry about pushing “position papers” and TV commentators and newspaper columnists revile the Jews for refusing to lay down their weapons. The killers are driven by hate, the politicians may be subject to by vanity and even naiveté.

Let us pray for Jerusalem, encourage and aid its defenders, and show love to others--no matter how he or she differs from you. For if there is one redeeming virtue in being under siege, it is the opportunity to realize that we're all in this together.

RECIPES

Some delicious treats to warm you up on these cold January days...

Perfect Hot Cocoa

Serves 1

A timeless classic for the whole family to enjoy!

- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon cocoa or
- 2 tablespoons cocoa for rich hot cocoa
- Dash salt
- 1 cup milk



Stir together milk, sugar, cocoa and salt in medium saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture comes to a boil. Remove from heat and serve.

VARIATIONS: Add three drops vanilla extract, one drop of mint extract or one drop of orange extract. Or try two teaspoons of your favorite liquor, one teaspoon instant coffee crystals or half a teaspoon of maple syrup.

Chai Masala

Serves 2



This is a unique beverage, originating in India but rapidly gaining popularity among the rest of the world. Masala is a mixture of spices used in Indian cooking that are known to warm the body by improving blood flow.

- 1/2 cup water
- 1 inch stick of cinnamon
- 3 cardamom pods
- 2 whole cloves
- 1/2 teaspoon of ginger, powder or fresh
- 2-3 black peppercorns
- 2/3 cup milk
- 2 tsp. sugar or to taste
- 1 teaspoon any loose black tea

Put water in saucepan. Add the cinnamon, cardamom, cloves, ginger and peppercorns and bring to a boil. Cover, turn heat to low and simmer for 10 minutes. Add the milk and sugar and bring to a boil again. Put in the tea leaves, cover, and turn off the heat. After 2 minutes, strain the tea into two cups and serve immediately.

Chai Kaimaki

Serves 1



Bucharian Jews serve traditional green tea at every opportunity, but this is a special treat they serve when it's extra cold!

- 1/4 cup water
- 1 teaspoon green tea leaves
- 3/4 cup milk
- Dash of salt
- 1 teaspoon butter
- 1 teaspoon sugar or according to taste

Place water and tea leaves in small saucepan and bring to boil. Strain out the leaves and return water to saucepan. Add milk and salt and bring to boil. Transfer to mug and add butter and sugar.

Milk and Honey

Serves 1



Simple and soothing, an excellent remedy for insomnia.

- 1 cup milk
- 1-2 teaspoons honey or according to taste

Place milk in a small sauce pan and place on medium fire. When boiled, remove from heat and transfer to mug. Add honey and stir.

THIS DAY IN JEWISH HISTORY

Torah translated into Greek (246 BCE)

In a second attempt to translate the Torah into Greek (after an unsuccessful attempt 61 years earlier), the ruling Greek-Egyptian emperor Ptolemy gathered 72 Torah sages, had them sequestered in 72 separate rooms, and ordered them to each produce a translation. On the 8th of Tevet of the year 3515 from creation (246 BCE) they produced 72 corresponding translations, including identical changes in 13 places (where they each felt that a literal translation would constitute a corruption of the Torah's true meaning). This Greek rendition became known as the Septuagint, "of the seventy" (though later versions that carry this name are not believed to be true to the originals). Greek became a significant second language among Jews as a result of this translation. During Talmudic times, Tevet 8 was observed by some as a fast day, expressing the fear of the detrimental effect of the translation.

Passing of Ezra (313 BCE)

Ezra, who led the return of the Jewish people to the Land of Israel after the Babylonian exile (423-353 BCE), oversaw the building of the Second Temple, canonized the 24 books of the Holy Scriptures ("bible") and, as head of the "Great Assembly" legislated a series of laws and practices (including formalized prayer) which left a strong imprint on Judaism to this very day, passed away on the 9th of Tevet of the year 3448 from creation (313 BCE -- exactly 1000 years after the Giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai). The passing of Ezra marked the end of the "Era of Prophecy."

Siege of Jerusalem (425 BCE)

On the 10th of Tevet of the year 3336 from Creation (425 BCE), the armies of the Babylonian emperor Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to Jerusalem. Thirty months later -- on Tammuz 9, 3338 -- the city walls were breached, and on Av 9th of that year, the Holy Temple was destroyed. The Jewish people were exiled to Babylonia for 70 years.

Jews expelled from Austria (1668)

On Tevet 11 the Jews were expelled from Austria.

Purim Hebron

On the 14th of Tevet, Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob came to the rescue of the Jewish community of Hebron, after an evil Pasha imprisoned its leaders and threatened to sell the entire Jewish population into slavery. The Sephardic community of Hebron would celebrate this day to mark the great miracle which occurred.

First New York Synagogue (1728)

In 1684, a group of Spanish and Portuguese Jews who fled the Inquisition (see "Today in Jewish History" for Tevet 22) held a Rosh Hashanah service in New Amsterdam, thereby founding congregation Shearith Israel ("Remnant of Israel"). On this 17th of Tevet in 1728, the congregation purchased a lot in Lower Manhattan to erect the first synagogue in New York.

Huna Killed (469)

The Exilarch ("Reish Galuta") of Babylonian Jewry, Huna Mori bar Mar Zutra, was executed in Pumpadita by order of the Persian emperor on the 18th of Tevet of the year 4229 from creation (469 of the common era). Also killed on that day was Rav Mesharshia bar Pekod (the third Jewish leader who was arrested with them, Rav Ameimar bar Mar Yenuka, was executed two months later).

Shimon Born (1567 BCE)

Shimon, the second son of Jacob and Leah and the progenitor of the Israelite tribe of Shimon, was born on Tevet 21 (according to another opinion, on Tevet 28), of the year 2194 from creation (1567 BCE), nine years after Jacob's arrival in Charan.

Decree of Expulsion Issued for Portuguese Jews (1496)

Following the death of King Joao of Portugal in 1494, his son King Manuel I ascended the throne. When his legitimacy as heir to the throne was challenged, Manuel wished to marry Princess Isabel of Spain, daughter of Ferdinand and Isabella, in order to solidify his position. As a precondition to the marriage, the Spanish monarch demanded that Portugal expel its Jews—many of whom were refugees from the 1492 Spanish Expulsion who found refuge in the neighboring country of Portugal. Manuel agreed, and five days after the marriage agreement was signed, on Tevet 23 (5257), he issued a decree giving Portugal's Jews eleven months to leave the country. Appreciating the Jews' economic value, Manuel was unhappy with the potential loss of this economic asset, and devised a way to have the Jews stay in Portugal—but as Christians. Initially, he instructed the Jews to leave from one of three ports, but soon he restricted them to leaving from Lisbon only. When October of 1497 arrived, thousands of Jews assembled there and were forcibly baptized. Many Jews decided to stay

and keep their Jewish faith secret; they were called Marranos or Crypto-Jews. Over the next 350 years, the infamous Inquisition persecuted, tortured and burned at the stake thousands of "marranos" throughout Spain, Portugal and their colonies for continuing to secretly practice the Jewish faith.

Sicilian Jews Forced to Wear Jewish Badges (1369)

On December 25, 1369 (5129), Tevet 26th, King Frederick III of Sicily ordered all Jews to wear a badge indicating their heritage. The badge consisted of a piece of red material, not smaller than the largest royal seal; men were required to wear it under the chin, and women on the chest.

Sadducees ejected from Sanhedrin (81 BCE)

Shimon ben Shetach successfully completed the expulsion of the Sadducees (a sect which denied the Oral Torah and the authority of the Sages) who had dominated the Sanhedrin (Supreme Court), replacing them with his Torah-loyal Pharisaic disciples, on the 28th of Tevet of the year 3680 from creation (81 BCE).

Moses Repeats the Torah

On the first of Shevat of the year 2488 from creation Moses convened the Jewish people and began the 37-day "review of the Torah" contained in the Book of Deuteronomy, which he concluded on the day of his passing on Adar 7 of that year.

Alexander-Yannai's death celebrated (76 BCE)

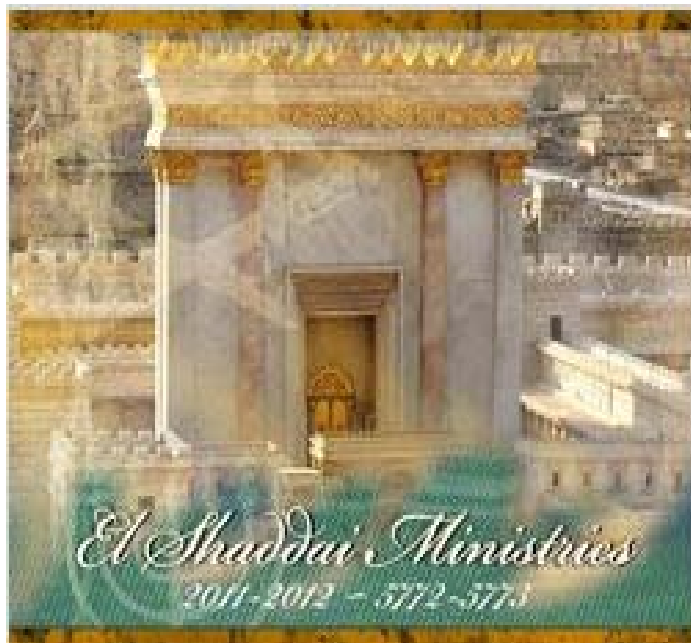
Hashmonean King Alexander-Yannai (Jannaeus), an avowed enemy of the Jewish sages, died on this date. So great was his cruelty and the ruthlessness with which he persecuted the Sages and those loyal to them (some 50,000 were killed in the years 82-76 BCE), that the day of his death was declared a holiday.

Majorcan Jews Guaranteed Protection (1393)

The governor of Majorca issued an edict for the protection of the Jewish inhabitants, providing that any citizen who injures a Jew will be hanged. The advantageous position of the islands, as well as their newly found protection, attracted many Jews from Provence, Sicily, Tunis, and Algiers, amongst other African cities. The Jews even had their own organizations and representatives by sanction of the King.
